## 4.21 / About the Heart / Mark 7:1-23

When is it alright to just go through the motions – let muscle memory take over and take you for a ride?

Familiar car ride / brushing teeth / mowing the lawn Conversation with your spouse (or a close friend)? **Relationships.** 

I think this relates with the passage we're going to examine today in Mark 7:1-23.

V 1 Jesus in Galilee – Pharisees and TOL come from Jerusalem – almost 90 miles away - to see Him. – Illus. Kirby Risk

Jesus is bringing a twist to the Jewish teaching about Yahweh.

V 2-4 It's helpful to understand here that ceremonial washing was not about hygiene; it was about ritual distinction. The world can defile you and as a Jew who has a relationship with Yahweh, you must wash **away** the impurity of the world.

Illus. Not me telling my boys to wash hands before dinner. It's about observing Jewish law and remaining ceremonially undefiled.

V 5 Reasonable question. Illus. Not bowing in Japan – certain times/ways/situations. Curtis apology. Even bow on phone.

## Vs 6-8 Astonishing – not a temperamental response but Astonishing

"you hypocrites..." - To call the Pharisees and teachers of the law "hypocrites"... that's a big deal. He's saying, you know and teach the law but don't live it. They knew it (regulations that is) better than anyone. They patterned their life around living it out.

The Pharisees and TOL ask Jesus a reasonable question about a Jewish regulation that **He is breaking** and he responds by telling them that **they** are the real law breakers. Onlookers have got to be thinking, "where is Jesus going with this because... we all know that **He's** the one breaking the law right now and the Pharisees and TOL are **the** law **keepers**?"

Imagine what the Pharisees and TOL are taking in right now:

Hypocrite / far from God/ worship in vain /letting go of God's commands.

I'm pretty certain they've never received that kind of feedback. This seems to be a pattern in the Gospel accounts.

If He's wrong than, wow... this an offensive accusation. But if He's right... then this could be speaking the truth in love.

## V 9-13 (after 9) Intensity – millstone comment in Mt 18

You're regulations which aim/claim to help one follow the law actually contradict the law. This sounds preposterous but Jesus **brilliantly** gives an example that **clearly** makes His point. Hearers are certainly astonished on two levels:

- 1. Jesus is calling the Pharisees and regulations -lawbreakers
- 2. He seems to be right.

Has your spouse or a good friend ever pointed something out that you are clearly doing wrong but you didn't realize it? At first, in response, you're stuck between surprise/anger, considering a defense, owning your wrong.

V14 While Pharisees and TOL are stuck, Jesus turns - addressing the crowd who is now listening, bringing them **all** into this **vulnerable** moment for the Pharisees and TOL.

V15 This makes sense (Illus. Water in a dirty pitcher).

(for a water pitcher) The cleanliness of the inside is actually what is more important than the cleanliness of the outside. **Yet**... if this principle is applied to following God's law... it pulls the rug out from under a significant portion of Jewish rules and regulations.

**Jesus is saying that** You and your regulations actually break God's law. Following God's law is less about the outside (the things you're doing) and more about how **clean you are on the inside**... Mic drop... turn to go with disciples.

V 17 Notice... Jesus stuns the Pharisees (*heart not law observance*) and turns to the crowd. Then he stuns the crowd (*heart not law observance*) and turns to his disciples who ask Him about this...

V 18-19 Nothing that enters from the outside can defile a person because it doesn't go into their heart... (Isaiah) honor with lips but hearts are far from me. Jesus is interested in our heart/soul - essence of who we are and what we love.

The **disciples** (not unlike the Pharisees and many others) are **fixated** on the law and regulations. Illus. Dog looking at the finger pointing.

**In this way**, the disciples were being dull – focused on the pointing hand rather than what it is pointing to.

In an effort to peal their eyes off the law and the regulations, Jesus actually sweeps the clean/unclean food regulations right off the table. (read vs 19)

V 20-23 Your heart is what matters. It always has been.

Heart/soul/essence of who you are and what you love. When **your heart** is set on someone or something above God, do you know what comes out? (see verse 21-23).

The Pharisees, TOL, and so many Jews were going through the motions, trying with varying levels of intensity to obey the rules and regulations. But their **hearts** were <u>far</u> from God.

Are our hearts far from God? Where is your heart?

Job, career, finances, school, kids, wife, friends, hobby, vacation, addiction...?

- Jews: If I'm following the 613 regulations, what does my heart matter?
- Today: If I'm kind to the people around me, generally responsible, and not breaking any laws... what does my heart matter? I just need to do the things and I'm fine.

There are plenty of areas in life where going through the motions can work out alright for you... but not in **relationships**. This teaching of Jesus is about a **relationship** not a list of rules. That is a relationship with the Living God in the person of Jesus. This is astonishing teaching!

In all of the other ancient religions it was about a series of things you needed to do to please, appease or even manipulate the gods. Jesus is teaching something **astonishing** and new. His aim is not behavioral submission or compliance, His aim is our **hearts**. He wants to purify our hearts so we can **experience love** and peace with the Living God.

If I need to wash my hands, I can start washing my hands. I can do that. But if I need to wash my heart... what do I do?

I want us to feel their bewilderment and astonishment.

Jesus doesn't tell them **how** to wash their heart.

In the same way that your spouse/close friend can't tell you exactly what **to do** in order **to love** them.

Jesus is not spelling it out for us because that would create dependence on a list of rules. With this list of rules... I may just go through the motions - which might work in driving, brushing your teeth, or mowing a lawn... **but it doesn't** work in a **relationship**.

Jesus wants a relationship with us. That's astonishing.
